The family's involvement began in the early 80s when Johnny joined the board of Hospice of Wake County headquartered in a small rented office space in Cameron Village, just a block from where Johnny's father, Banks Kerr, opened his first drugstore in 1950. "The Hospice board met in a cramped wood paneled room with folding metal chairs and a folding table," said Johnny. "There were maybe 20 or 30 patients and no Medicare or health insurance reimbursement. But what really impressed me then was that Dr. Dunlap had created an organization that provided excellent hospice care regardless of the patient's ability to pay for it."


The Kerr family's support has remained consistent during the rapid growth of what was Hospice of Wake County then to what is Transitions LifeCare today.

In 2000, the Transitions LifeCare team was there for Banks Kerr during his illness and passing. To Bank's memory, his wife Dorothy provided the funding to build the sanctuary that graces the campus of Hospice Home serving patients and their families.


Transitions would also be there for Dorothy during her passing in 2014.
