It started to bother me that there were hospice homes in many places in our state, but none in our area. So when Billy Dunlap and Smedes York asked me to chair the major gifts committee for the capital campaign, I accepted without a moment's hesitation.

When I founded North State Bank, the staff chose Transitions LifeCare as the primary cause on which to focus our time, energy and money. Thus was born Summer Salute, our annual fundraising bash. Now, 14 years later, Summer Salute has raised nearly \$1.4 million for Transitions LifeCare. Our planning committee meets every month, year-round, to prepare a truly exciting and memorable event for as many as 500 guests.
